



Jill Trenary

Combining artistry, athleticism and an unwavering work ethic, Jill Trenary ascended to the pinnacle of ladies figure skating by capturing a gold medal at the 1990 World Championships in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Her success on the international stage was preceded by three U.S. National Championships (1987, 1989 and 1990) and a second-place finish in the 1988 U.S. Nationals.

In addition to capturing the World Championship in 1990, Trenary was a bronze medalist at the 1989 World Championships and a silver medalist at the 1990 Goodwill Games. In her first senior-level international competition, Trenary placed seventh at the 1987 World Championships and followed with a fifth-place finish in 1988.

Trenary narrowly missed a medal at the 1988 Olympic Winter Games in Calgary, Alberta, placing fourth.

Following her decorated amateur career, Trenary competed as a professional figure skater in 1992-93 and again in 1996-97 before retiring from competition.

Originally from Minnetonka, Minnesota, Trenary moved to Colorado Springs in 1985 at age 16 to work full-time with legendary figure skating coach Carlo Fassi. In 1994, she married British ice dancing champion Christopher Dean. The couple resides in Colorado Springs where they are raising their two sons, Jack and Sam.
